Family Nurturing Center's Visitation Program provides an essential opportunity for children in the child welfare system to visit with birth families in a safe, supervised setting and build skills needed to enhance healthy family functioning. Our visitation model allows family members to visit in family-friendly environments where they experience respect and encouragement and provide individualized experiences based on the strengths and struggles of each family. It promotes safe and healthy family interactions designed to minimize trauma and increase healthy relationships. While traditional supervised visitation services provide a neutral, objective and third party account of interactions, facilitated visitation is a hands-on approach that helps parents increase skills and develop stronger family relationships. The Visitation Facilitators are "active helpers" and provide coaching, modeling, intervention and feedback to support the families throughout the visitation process.



What began as a pilot program in 2007 has grown to be a signature service, providing more than 1,600 visits per month at our facility and in home and community settings. When we learned that the building we rented in Queensgate was being torn down, we had no choice

but to find new space. This was a significant challenge since we needed nearly 20,000 square feet, onsite parking and access to an outdoor play - all on a tight budget. After months of looking, we found the perfect space to accommodate our continued growth and need for a new facility, centrally located in Hamilton County on Reading Road. In typical Family Nurturing Center fashion, staff pulled together to do the impossible. They spent their holidays moving, packing and unpacking to meet an aggressive timeline and limit any disruption of services.

The new facility boasts 33 percent more space and includes visitation rooms, counseling rooms, a large training room and areas to offer parent education services. The building is on a bus line and has multiple other nonprofit tenants in the building, allowing our clients access to other essential resources like Catholic Charities/Su Casa and Greater Cincinnati Behavioral Health.

From the lobby to the visitation spaces, the new facility provides bright, welcoming spaces. We offer areas for visitation that respect privacy, along with indoor and outdoor play areas for fine and gross motor development, dramatic play and craft areas, a book nook and a family kitchen area to prepare or enjoy a snack together.

We are grateful to the Scripps Howard Foundation, The Carol Ann and Ralph V. Haile, Jr./US Bank Foundation, and the Ohio Valley Foundation through the Fifth Third Bank Foundation for their financial support of the move, along with Toyota Motor Engineering & Manufacturing North America and the Kroger Company for their generous in-kind support and donations of work stations, office furniture, office supplies and more. We are still seeking donations to install a playground for families to enjoy. # April is Child Abuse Prevention Month



A hero is defined as someone who can be looked up to for their actions. Bravery is usually the biggest trait of a hero. This person has usually overcome huge obstacles to survive or to rescue others. Tasha Turner definitely meets that criteria. She is a hero.

Tasha was the featured speaker at the 2018 Blue Ribbon Ceremony to kick off April as Child Abuse Prevention Month. The annual ceremony was once again hosted at Tom Gill Chevrolet in Florence. Tasha bravely shared her story as a survivor of childhood abuse in front of a crowd of 200 guests..

"It takes great courage to speak in front of people but particularly to share such a personal and painful story," said Jane Herms, executive director for Family Nurturing Center. "While everyone was moved, some may have been more personally impacted finding solidarity in the journey of other adult survivors of childhood abuse. Tasha has become their hero," Jane added.

Tasha grew up in a world where her father controlled every aspect of her life - both mentally and physically. Her first memory of being sexually abused was when she was 3 years old. Waking up from discomfort, unsure of what was happening but told by her father to "lay still". "This stillness was the beginning of many still moments in my life," said Tasha.


Tasha told the crowd, "Had only my schools showed me the Kids on the Block puppet program offered by Family Nurturing Center, I would have been able to recognize, resist and report such abuse." Had her father's girlfriend taken the Stewards of Children training she would have known how to report the abuse when Tasha told her of the father's actions.

But Tasha found heroes in her life. The work supervisor who helped Tasha and her sister escape. The friend who took her in, knowing she had nothing to give back. Her husband who worked to gain her love and trust and now raise children together. And most importantly, Tasha became her own hero.

"I could have easily fallen into the trap of being a victim by doing drugs, alcohol or abusing others, but I didn't," said Tasha. "I became my own hero."

There are 42 million survivors of sexual abuse in the U.S., and 90 percent of those survivors knew their abusers. It is estimated that 60 percent of sexually abused children never tell anyone.

"There is a hero hidden in all of us," Tasha said. "We all have the responsibility to end the cycle of child abuse. At the end of the day, the action you take or fail to take is what counts. You have the power to change, fight and influence to change others. Be a hero."



- Learn the indicators of abuse and neglect.
- Reach out to a struggling family in need.
- Talk to a child in your life about sexual abuse and go beyond Stranger Danger.
- Take a Stewards of Children training.
- Report your suspicions of abuse or neglect to the authorities.
- Teach your child the proper names for private body parts.
- Ask if Kids on the Block has been to your child's elementary school.

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# FAMILY NURTURING CENTER ENCOURAGES SIMPLE ACTIONS TO HELP KEEP CHILDREN SAFE

The Child Victims' Trust Fund (CVTF) is administered through the State Child Sexual Abuse and Exploitation Prevention Board. CVTF funds come solely from the tax refund check-off program, the "I Care About Kids" license plate program and private donations. The Fund supports abuse prevention and education programs across the state, as well as providing the portion of child sexual abuse exams not covered by Medicaid or private insurance.

## TWO SIMPLE WAYS THAT KENTUCKY RESIDENTS CAN HELP:

### 1.) Check Off Box on State Tax Returns

Contributions to this fund finance local programs designed to prevent the sexual abuse and exploitation of children. This fund is administered through the Kentucky Attorney General's Office and relies solely on the tax-deductible contributions made by interested citizens.

### 2.) Purchase the "I Care About Kids" License Plate

Select the colorful "I Care About Kids" license plate at your



local county clerk's office the next time you renew. Proceeds from the "I Care About Kids" license plate go the Child Victims' Trust Fund for helping Kentucky's most vulnerable children - those who are victims of sexual abuse. CVTF provides support for the Stewards of Children program offered through Family Nurturing Center. Stewards of Children is a revolutionary prevention program designed to educate adults on how to prevent, recognize and respond to child sexual abuse. Trainings are offered free of charge in Northern Kentucky.

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#### **PROGRAMS**

Child Abuse Treatment Services – Specialized trauma-informed therapy for child victims of abuse: sexual, physical, domestic violence, emotional/neglect and other violent crimes. These free programs include individual and family counseling, social and healthy coping skills groups, and therapeutic groups for child sexual abuse victims.

Community Education and Training – Specialized fee-based training programs and seminars covering topics such as parenting, child development, child abuse recognition and reporting, impacts of abuse, the nurturing philosophy and more.

Every Parent's Library – A free parenting video lending service for expectant parents and parents with children ages birth to 2 years. Each video will provide parenting advice from the experts for developing parenting skills, ways to reduce stress and methods to improve your child's health.

Kids on the Block – Child abuse education and awareness program using life-size puppets in local elementary schools and community events. This free traveling puppet troupe gives children the tools they need to recognize, resist and report child abuse.

Nurturing Parenting Programs – Family-based parenting education programs proven to help families develop healthier, stronger relationships. A variety of curricula are available including programs for parenting of infants and toddlers, school age and adolescent children as well as the Nurturing Fathers Program. These free programs are provided in Boone, Campbell and Kenton counties.

S.O.A.R. (Survivors of Abuse Recovery) – Serving adults who have experienced childhood sexual abuse victimization. This weekly program is available to men and women.

Stewards of Children – Public education program designed to educate adults on how to prevent, recognize and respond responsibly to child sexual abuse. This free program is available to private and public agencies, schools, law enforcement, clergy and parents.

Visitation – Supervised visitation promotes healthy relationships between children and non-custodial parents. Our Facilitated Visitation programs occur in our Hamilton County location for families referred by Hamilton County Jobs and Family Services.

Most direct service programs are offered at donated sites across Greater Cincinnati. Strong community support, a dedicated staff and the spirit of volunteerism allow this agency to provide quality programs in a very cost-effective manner. Many Family Nurturing Center services are offered free of charge. Please call (859) 525-3200 for more information.
