*"At first glance it was nothing special. A small room with a single table, a few chairs, and a box of tissues. But that box of tissues told the whole story. This was the place for final goodbyes. The place where the best result for the child meant a termination of parental rights. This room held the last words, the last hug, the last gifts. That box of tissues was the last thing they would share."*

She saw it: the heartbreak of the past living right alongside the hope for a new future. This is true for all our families.

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# BIG IMPACT

We've all had to adjust to a new "virtual" life and our families in the foster care system are no exception.

While today families are again able to connect in-person using rotating schedules and built in "quarantine time", there were a handful of months where we were conducting visits exclusively virtually. Virtual family visitations can be awkward but keeping these people connected to each other in any way we can is invaluable.

We did a virtual visit with a family of four, Mom, a teenage boy, and two young girls. Keeping everyone engaged can be tricky but this family radiated love. Mom was diligent in asking specific questions and praising each kid. They all expressed their feelings for each other, even the teenage boy shared,

The girls put on a show for their mom and brother. The entire visit was full of smiles and laughter.

But there is a story behind the story.

"Mom" is actually the kids' maternal grandmother, their biological mother unable to raise her children because of struggles with addiction. This grandma is fighting through a strained relationship with her own daughter, homelessness, and the agony of having her grandchildren removed from her care. She misses them immensely and tries to stay strong when she's with them.



## INTERACTION ROOM

We are only one of a few providers for Parent-Child Interaction Therapy (PCIT), an innovative approach that allows for hands-on coaching by a trained clinician to the caregiver through an earpiece that is aimed at enhancing relationships and equipping caregivers with the ability to successfully navigate trauma-based behaviors.

**THE KIDS ON THE BLOCK PROGRAM** provides school based prevention services which increase public awareness about the problem of child abuse and equips children with the skills to recognize and report such abuse and bullying and school safety.

Following the presentation, the puppeteers are trained to address issues related to child abuse and answer questions from the children via the puppets, so that children can clarify any information and gain additional insight into abuse.

## Training

### *Carol Lapin, Director of Training*

Our mission demands that we do everything within our power to end the cycle of child abuse. Part of that is acknowledging that we cannot do it all, and we cannot do it alone.

Our training program, run by Carol Lapin, offers a wide range of education, awareness and skill trainings to professionals and community groups. Customized workshops, trainings, and in-services are available on a fee-for-service basis. CEUs are available from the OH Social Work Board and KY Board of Social Work.

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Carol Lapin is the Director of Training at the Family Nurturing Center. She has a Master of Science in Social Work and for more than 20 years, Carol has been teaching, training, and sharing the philosophy and skills of the Nurturing Parenting Programs® for adults, children and adolescents in Northern Kentucky and Cincinnati. In 1998, she received the recognition of Dr. Stephen Bavolek, principal author of the programs, as a National Trainer of Trainers in the Nurturing Parenting Programs.

In 2010, Carol received recognition from Mark Perlman, author of the Nurturing Fathers Program, as

a Certified Consultant and Master Trainer. At the 2015 Nurturing Father's Summit, Carol Lapin was awarded the "Woman of the Year" for her support of fathers and their families. According to Mark Perlman, "Since 2009, Carol has been instrumental in promoting father involvement at Family Nurturing Center by including the Nurturing Father's Curriculum in their programming. She became a Master Trainer for Nurturing Father's Programs in 2010 and has trained professionals throughout Kentucky and Ohio to facilitate Nurturing Father's Programs in their community."

## PROGRAMS

- Conduct tailored **EDUCATION PROGRAMS** for schools, organizations and community events designed to teach children how to recognize and report child abuse and teach adults how to prevent, recognize, and respond to child abuse.
- Support the development of strong, healthy relationships through family-based **PARENTING SERVICES**.
- Partner with the **OHIO CHILD WELFARE SYSTEM** to provide supervised visitation services and parent enrichment services.
- Provide comprehensive, specialized, trauma-responsive **COUNSELING SERVICES and HOLISTIC WELLNESS ACTIVITIES** for child victims of abuse and adult survivors of childhood abuse.
- Facilitate **PROFESSIONAL TRAINING** to elevate skills and competencies when working with children, adults, and families.
